Session 1: Introduction to Public Service / Conducting Public Meetings - January 14

A two part presentation about the basic requirements and challenges associated with public service, and the principles and best practices that provide a framework for conducting effective public meetings. Topics covered in part one include the duties and responsibilities of public officials, codes of ethics, standards of conduct, conflicts of interest, and open meeting laws. Part two covers meeting types, legal requirements, the meeting environment, and meeting procedures.

Session 2: Public Sector Boards & Commissions – January 21
